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1. Introduction

1.1. Important Safety Notice

NOTE:

Generally, the products without the Quick Changer v2 interface, are not in the scope of this manual.

NOTE:

In case when the used Compute Box has lower software/firmware version, please update before use. For detailed instructions on the update refer to Web Client description at the end of this Manual.

1.3. Naming Convention

1.3.1. HEX-E QC/HEX-H QC

The HEX-E QC and HEX-H QC names as model variants are used separately or together as HEX-E/H QC if the information is relevant for both variants.

1.3.2. 3FG15

The 3FG15 product sometimes will be called TFG as Three-Finger Gripper.

1.3.3. RG2/RG6

The RG2 and RG6 names as model variants are used separately or together as RG2/6 if the information is relevant for both variants.



2. Safety

The robot integrators are responsible for ensuring that the applicable safety laws and regulations in the country concerned are observed and that any significant hazards in the complete robot application are eliminated. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Performing a risk assessment for the complete robot system
- Interfacing other machines and additional safety devices if defined by the risk assessment
- Setting up the appropriate safety settings in the robot software
- Ensuring that the user will not modify any safety measures
- Validating that the total robot system is designed and installed correctly
- Specifying instructions for use
- Marking the robot installation with relevant signs and contact information of the integrator
- Collecting all documentation in a technical file; including the risk assessment and this manual

2.1. Intended Use

OnRobot tools are intended to be used on collaborative robots and light industrial robots with different payloads depending on the end-of-arm tooling specifications. OnRobot tools are normally use in pick-and-place, palletizing, machine tending, assembly, quality testing and inspection and surface finishing applications.

The end-of-arm tooling should only operate under conditions noted in **8.1. Technical Sheets** section.

Any use or application deviating from intended use is deemed to be impermissible misuse. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Use in potentially explosive atmospheres
- Use in medical and life critical applications
- Use before performing a risk assessment
- Use outside the permissible operational conditions and specifications
- Use close to a human's head, face and eye area
- Use as a climbing aid

2.2. General Safety Instructions

Generally, all national regulations, legislations and laws in the country of installation must be observed. Integration and use of the product must be done in compliance with precautions in this manual. Particular attention must be paid to the following warnings:

The information in this manual does not cover designing, installing, and operating a complete robot application, nor does it cover other peripheral equipment that can influence the safety of the complete system. The complete system must be designed and installed in accordance with the safety requirements set forth in the standards and regulations of the country where the robot is installed.

Any safety information provided in this manual must not be construed as a warranty, by OnRobot A/S, that the robot application will not cause injury or damage, even if robot application complies with all safety instructions.

OnRobot A/S disclaims any and all liability if any of OnRobot tools tooling are damaged, changed or modified in any way. OnRobot A/S cannot be held responsible for any damages caused to any of OnRobot tools tooling, the robot, or any other equipment due to programming errors or malfunctioning of any of OnRobot tools.



WARNING:

OnRobot tools are not allowed to be exposed to condensing conditions when power is on or when connected to a robot. If condensing conditions appear during transport or storage, the product must be placed between 20 and 40 Celsius degrees for 24 hours before power is applied or before connected to a robot.

It is recommended that OnRobot tools are integrated in compliance with the following guides and standards:

- ISO 10218-2
- ISO 12100
- ISO/TR 20218-1
- ISO/TS 15066

2.3. Risk Assessment

The robot integrator must perform a risk assessment on the complete robot application. OnRobot tools are only components in a robot application and therefore they can be only safely operated if the integrator has considered the safety aspects of the whole application. OnRobot tools are designed with relatively smooth and round design with a limited amount of sharp edges and pinch points

In collaborative applications, the trajectory of the robot can play a significant safety role. The integrator must consider the angle of contact with a human body, e.g. orientate OnRobot tools and workpieces so that the contact surface in the direction of movement is as large as possible. It is recommended that the tool connectors are pointed in the direction opposite to the movement.



OnRobot A/S have identified the potential hazards listed below as significant hazards that must be considered by the integrator:

- Objects flying from OnRobot tools due to loss of grip
- Objects falling down from OnRobot tools due to loss of grip
- Injuries due to collisions between humans and workpieces, OnRobot tools tooling, robot or other obstacles
- · Consequences due to loosen of bolts
- · Consequences if OnRobot tools cable gets stuck to something
- · Workpiece itself represents a hazard

2.4. Environmental Safety

OnRobot A/S products must be disposed of in accordance with the applicable national laws, regulations and standards.

The product is produced with restricted use of hazardous substances to protect the environment; as defined by the EU RoHS Directive 2011/65/EU. These substances include mercury, cadmium, lead, chromium VI, polybrominated biphenyls and polybrominated diphenyl ethers.

Observe national **registration** requirements for importers according to EU WEEE Directive 2012/19/EU.







2.5. PLd CAT3 Safety Function

A safety-rated function has been designed as two buttons at the two arms of the product, conforming to ISO 13849-1 PLd CAT3.

This Safety Function has a max response time of 100 ms and a MTTF of 2883 years.

The behavior of the safety system is described below:

If something activates the two Safety Buttons, see picture below, the safety control system stops motion of the two arms of the product. Motion is then prevented as long as one or both of the two buttons are activated.





PLd CAT3 Safety Buttons

If this happens while running the robot program, the following popup dialog will be shown.




When any of the buttons in this dialog is pressed, the safety system will show the following popup dialog.



When any of the buttons in this dialog is pressed, the robot will be unlocked.

To reinitialize the gripper, open the toolbar and press the icon. Then, robot program can be re-started.







CAUTION:

Before pressing the button always make sure that no part will be dropped due to the loss of gripper power. If Dual Quick Changer is used it will cycle the power for both sides.



NOTE:

If the robot program is started and one of the safety switches has been previously pressed, the second popup will appear. The process to unlock the gripper is the same.



2.6. Screwdriver Safety Features

2.6.1. Screw-bit System Always Hidden

The Screwdriver has been designed so that the Screw-bit System can always be hidden inside the housing to enhance safety.

The Move Shank command will allow the user to hide the Screw-bit System inside the housing at any time.

Additionally, the software has been designed so that after running a Tighten, Loosen or Pick Screw command, the Screw-bit System will be automatically hidden inside the housing.



NOTE:

As mentioned in the technical sheet, this safety functionality will be achieved if the screw length is equal or less than 35 mm.



2.6.2. Operational Safety

The Screwdriver has been designed so that its operations must be executed when the distance between the Screwdriver's bottom part and the surface where the action takes place is within the range of 0-8 mm (see image below). If the distance is higher than this, the Screwdriver operations will not be successful, and the system will generate an error.



From a safety perspective, this ensures that nothing larger than 8 mm is exposed to be harmed by the Screw-bit System while executing a Screwdriver operation.

For instance, if a hand is located on the workpiece when the robot moves toward the recorded waypoint, the robot in a collaborative installation will have a protective stop when hitting the hand as it does not reach the recorded waypoint (as a hand is thicker than 8 mm). Additionally, If the robot reaches the recorded waypoint and starts the screwing operation, the <8 mm distance prevents the user from placing a hand/finger underneath during a Screwdriver operation.





NOTE:

As mentioned in the technical sheet, this safety functionality will be achieved if the screw length is up to 35 mm.

2.6.3. Automatic Safety Feature

An automatic safety feature has been implemented to reduce the possibility of the users to be in danger.

This safety feature is activated if the Screw-bit System detects a force above 40N during operation. In such a case, a mechanical mechanism will immediately retract the shank and hide it (up to 35 mm screw length).



If this happens while running the robot program, it will stop, and the following popup dialog will be shown.



After pressing any of these 2 buttons, the Screwdriver can be enabled by opening the toolbar and pressing the button. Then, robot program can be re-started.

Additionally, if the bottom part of the Screw-bit System detects an unexpected force above 20N while not in operation, the Screw-bit system will retract and be temporarily hidden into the housing (up to 35 mm screw length). This will not stop the robot program, only temporarily hide the Screw-bit System.





CAUTION:

This retract functionality does not work if the power is interrupted. Further actions may be required to eliminate the risk, identified by the risk assessment.



3. Operation Mode(s)

This document covers installation and operation for both:

- UR CB3 series robot controllers
- and UR e-Series robot controllers.

Since the two controllers have similar installation and operation screens in these cases only the e-Series screens are shown. Where the two requires different steps or screens it is highlighted and referred as:

- CB3 series
- e-Series.

There are two ways how the product(s) could be used on both UR series:

Modes of Operation				
via Compute Box works with all products and product combinations	via UR's Tool Connector works with only one of these: • 3FG15 (Only on e-Series) or • RG2 or • RG6 or • SG or • VG10 or			

Generally, the two modes of operation require the same installation/operation steps. Where the two modes require different steps, it is highlighted and referred as:

- · via Tool Connector
- via Compute Box



4. HW Installation

4.1. Overview

For a successful installation the following steps will be required:

- Mount the components
- · Setup the software

In the following sections, these installation steps will be described.


4.2. Mounting

Required steps:

- Optional mount the Angle Bracket
- · Mount the Quick Changer option
- Mount the tool(s)

In the following two subsections these two mounting steps will be described.

4.2.1. Optional - Angle Bracket



Angle Bracket

- 1. M6x10 screws (ISO14580 8.8)
- 2. Angle Bracket (ISO 9409-1-50-4-M6)
- 3. Dowel pin Ø6x10 (ISO2338 h8)
- 4. Adapter/Robot tool flange (ISO 9409-1-31.5-4-M5)

Use 10 Nm tightening torque.



NOTE:

If using the optional Angle Bracket, make sure to always adjust the TCP as described in the **8.3.10**. **COG**, **TCP** section. Otherwise some of the functionality may not work properly.




NOTE:

With Angle Bracket the HEX-E/H QC and the Dual QC is not supported.







4.2.5.1. 3FG15



HEX-E/H QC

- 1. HEX-E/H QC sensor
- 2. M4x6mm (ISO14581 A2)
- 3. M6x8mm (DIN7984LT A2)
- 4. HEX-E/H QC adapter
- 5. Adapter/ Robot tool flange (ISO 9409-1-50-4-M6)

Use 1.5 Nm tightening torque for M4x6mm

Use 3.8 Nm tightening torque for M6x8mm

Step 1:

Move the tool close to the Quick Changer as illustrated.

The hook mechanism (rod and hook tongue) will keep the lower part locked once mounted.


Step 2:

Flip the tool until it is fully mated, and you hear a clicking sound.

To unmount the tool, press the aluminum button on the Quick Changer and repeat the steps in the reverse order.



4.2.5.2. RG2



Step 1:

Move the tool close to the Quick Changer as illustrated.

The hook mechanism (rod and hook tongue) will keep the lower part locked once mounted.


Step 2:

Flip the tool until it is fully mated, and you hear a clicking sound.

To unmount the tool, press the aluminum button on the Quick Changer and repeat the steps in the reverse order.

To change the relative angle of the gripper to the Quick Changer:

- first remove the four M4x6 screws
- tilt the gripper between -90° and 90°
- then put the four M4x6 screws back and use 3.5 Nm tightening torque to fix it.






WARNING:

Never use the device while any of the four M4x6 screws are removed.



4.2.5.3. RG2-FT



Step 1:

Move the tool close to the Quick Changer as illustrated.

The hook mechanism (rod and hook tongue) will keep the lower part locked once mounted.


Step 2:

Flip the tool until it is fully mated, and you hear a clicking sound.

To unmount the tool, press the aluminum button on the Quick Changer and repeat the steps in the reverse order.

To change the relative angle of the gripper to the Quick Changer:

- first remove the four M4x6 screws
- tilt the gripper between -60° and 90°
- then put the four M4x6 screws back and use 3.5 Nm tightening torque to fix it.





WARNING:

Never use the device while any of the four M4x6 screws are removed.



4.2.5.4. RG6



Step 1:

Move the tool close to the Quick Changer as illustrated.

The hook mechanism (rod and hook tongue) will keep the lower part locked once mounted.


Step 2:

Flip the tool until it is fully mated, and you hear a clicking sound.

To unmount the tool, press the aluminum button on the Quick Changer and repeat the steps in the reverse order.

To change the relative angle of the gripper to the Quick Changer:

- first remove the four M4x6 screws
- tilt the gripper between -90° and 90°
- then put the four M4x6 screws back and use 3.5 Nm tightening torque to fix it.





WARNING:

Never use the device while any of the four M4x6 screws are removed.



4.2.5.5. Screwdriver



Step 1:

Move the tool close to the Quick Changer as illustrated.

The hook mechanism (rod and hook tongue) will keep the lower part locked once mounted.

Step 2:

Flip the tool until it is fully mated, and you hear a clicking sound.


To unmount the tool, press the aluminum button on the Quick Changer and repeat the steps in the reverse order.



CAUTION:

Make sure to use the 4.5A version of the Quick Changers.

The hook mechanism (rod and hook tongue) will keep the lower part locked once mounted.



Flip the tool until it is fully mated, and you hear a clicking sound.





To unmount the tool, press the aluminum button on the Quick Changer and repeat the steps in the reverse order.

4.3. Wiring

The two operation modes require different wiring.



DANGER:

Use only original OnRobot tool data cables.


Via Tool Connector

This operation mode can be used with only one of these devices:

- 3FG15 (Only for e-Series)
- RG2 / RG6
- SG
- VG10 / VGC10

For e-Series

Connect the Quick Changer to the UR's tool connector.





DANGER:

Never connect the Quick Changer for I/O to an e-Series UR robot's Tool Connector.



NOTE:

VG10 / VGC10 can only be attached when the UR controller is started (not in IDLE mode) and no program is running or completely powered off.




CAUTION:

Dual Quick Changer cannot be connected to the Tool Connector, it must be used via Compute Box.

For CB3

Connect the Quick Changer for I/O to the UR's tool connector.







DANGER:


Never connect the Quick Changer or Dual Quick Changer to a CB3 UR robot's tool connector.

Wiring via Tool Connector is finished.

Via Compute Box

Three cables need to be connected to wire the system properly:

- Tool data cable between the tool(s) and the Compute Box
- Ethernet communication cable between the robot controller and the Compute Box
- Power supply of the Compute Box





NOTE:

For the Quick Changer - Robot Side no cable is needed to be connected.

4.3.1. Tool Data Cable

4.3.1.1. 3FG15, RG2, RG6, Screwdriver, SG, VG10, VGC10

First connect the data cable to the tool.





Use the M8-8pin connector on the Quick Changer or on the Dual Quick Changer.

Use the cable holder as illustrated on the left.



CAUTION:

Make sure to use the supplied cable holder to prevent any excessive strain on the 90-degree M8 connector caused by the rotation of the cable.

Then route the Tool data cable to the Compute Box (CB) and use the supplied Velcro tape (black) to fix it.



NOTE:

Make sure that during the routing some extra length is used at the joints so that cable is not pulled when the robot moves.

Also make sure that the cable bending radius is minimum 40mm (for the HEX-E/H QC it is 70mm).

Finally, connect the other end of the Tool data cable to the Compute Box's DEVICES connector.






CAUTION:

Quick Changer and Dual Quick Changer can only be used to power OnRobot tools.

4.3.1.2. HEX-E/H QC

First connect the data cable to the tool.





Use the marked M12-12pin connector on the HEX-E/H QC.

Then route the Tool data cable to the Compute Box (CB) and use the supplied Velcro tape (black) to fix it.



NOTE:

Make sure that during the routing some extra length is used at the joints so that cable is not pulled when the robot moves.

Also make sure that the cable bending radius is minimum 40mm (for the HEX-E/H QC it is 70mm).

Finally, connect the other end of the Tool data cable to the Compute Box's DEVICES connector.






CAUTION:

Quick Changer and Dual Quick Changer can only be used to power OnRobot tools.

4.3.1.3. RG2-FT

First connect the data cable to the tool.



For RG2-FT the Quick Changer tool data connector cannot be used. Instead use the marked M8-4pin connector.

Then route the Tool data cable to the Compute Box (CB) and use the supplied Velcro tape (black) to fix it.





NOTE:

Make sure that during the routing some extra length is used at the joints so that cable is not pulled when the robot moves.

Also make sure that the cable bending radius is minimum 40mm (for the HEX-E/H QC it is 70mm).

Finally, connect the other end of the Tool data cable to the Compute Box's DEVICES connector.





CAUTION:

Quick Changer and Dual Quick Changer can only be used to power OnRobot tools.

4.3.2. Ethernet Cable

Connect one end of the supplied Ethernet (UTP) cable to the robot controller's Ethernet (LAN) port.



NOTE:

If the robot controller's Ethernet port is in use, use a standard 4-port Ethernet switch to be able to use two network devices at the same time.

Connect the other end of the supplied cable to the Compute Box's ETHERNET connector.





CAUTION:

Use only shielded, maximum 3m long Ethernet cables.



WARNING:

Check and make sure that the Compute Box enclosure (metal) and the robot controller enclosure (metal) are not connected (no galvanic connection between the two).



4.3.3. Power Supply

Connect the supplied power supply to the Compute Box 24V connector.

NOTE:

To disconnect the power connector, make sure to pull the connector housing (where the arrows are shown) and not the cable.



CAUTION:

Use only original OnRobot power supplies.

Finally, power up the power supply that will power the Compute Box and the connected Tool(s).



5. SW Installation

5.1. Install URCap

UR CB3




NOTE:

The minimum UR PolyScope version is **3.10**. Please remove all previous OnRobot URCap version(s) before the installation. The controller version must be CB3.1.

For the HEX-E/H QC products the **3.12** is not recommended.

1. Insert the OnRobot USB drive in the USB slot on the right side of the Teach Pendant.



- 2. Select the **Setup Robot** option from the main menu, then the **URCaps** option.
- Tap on the + sign to browse for the OnRobot URCap file. It can be found in the usbdisk/UR/URCAP folder. Tap on Open.

UR e-Series



NOTE:

The minimum UR PolyScope version is **5.4**. Please remove all previous OnRobot URCap version(s) before the installation.

For the HEX-E/H QC products the **5.6** is not recommended, instead please use the **5.7**.

 Insert the OnRobot USB drive in the USB slot on the top right side of the Teach Pendant.



- 2. Then tap on the menu (top right corner of the screen), then from the **System** section tap on the **URCaps** menu.
- Tap on the + sign to browse for the OnRobot URCap file. It can be found in the usbdisk/UR/URCAP folder. Tap on Open.



4. The system needs to be restarted for the changes to take effect. Tap on the Restart button and then wait for the system to be restarted.

5.2. Uninstall Software

UR CB3

- 1. Select the **Setup Robot** option from the main menu, then the URCaps option.
- 2. Select the OnRobot URCap file.
- 3. Tap on the sign.

UR e-Series

- 1. Tap on the menu (top right corner of the screen), then from the **System** section tap on the **URCaps** menu.
- 2. Select the OnRobot URCap file.




5.3. URCap Setup

For the e-Series UR robots, tap on the **Installation** tab in the top menu. Then tap on the **URCaps**.




For the CB3 UR robots select the **Installation** tab, then select **OnRobot Setup**. The following screen is shown:





Device info

In the normal view of the panel, the available functions are shown below:





Dropdown menu to select a device-robot communication channel: Select whether you want to discover the devices connected to the tool connector or to the compute box.

Use the reload button \circ to find new available devices.



NOTE:

To use the newly discovered devices you might need to restart PolyScope. To do that simply press the **Restart now** button. Remember to save it before, if there are any unsaved changes in your program or settings.



NOTE:

After setting up the device the changes need to be saved to be part of the current installation.

For the e-Series UR robots tap on the **Save** button (from the top menu and use the **Save Installation** button ...

For the CB3 UR robots use the **Save** button ...



NOTE:


OnRobot products are checked after the robot is restarted and the saved settings are restored while loading a program. That check could take up to 5 seconds via the Quick Changer for I/O. Therefore make sure to wait at least 5 seconds before you start your program. To make sure that the device is connected check the **Device info**.

If the connected OnRobot product is changed, always go to the **Device info** to check if the change was successful.

To communicate through the tool connector on an e-Series UR robot please set the following configuration:

- 1. Press the **General** dropdown menu on the left side.
- 2. Press the **Tool IO** tab.
- 3. In the Controlled by dropdown menu select OnRobot as shown in the image below.
- 4. Make sure to save the changes to be part of the current installation.





To communicate through the tool connector on CB3 UR robot please set the following configuration:

- 1. Go to the I/O tab.
- 2. In the Controlled by dropdown menu select OnRobot as shown in the image below.
- 3. Make sure to save the changes to be part of the current installation.







NOTE:

If the Tool connector option is selected in the **Device info** drop-down menu but no OnRobot product is connected to the tool connector then a background service program is running every 2 seconds. In addition to that the Tool IO is set to be logic high and low randomly.



To select a different attachment configuration press on \odot .






Here the actual mounting can be selected to set up the TCP correctly. The different options are:

- **Standard**: Device with only four cups attached to it. This selection will set the TCP at the center of the end side of the cups (see table below).
- **Pipe + Cup**: Device with the extension pipe with a cup placed in the right side using the letter A as reference. This selection will set the TCP at the end of the cup placed on the extension pipe (see table below).
- Adaptor + Cups: Device with the adaptor with cups. This adaptor allows to create several
 configurations. This selection will set the TCP at the center of the end side of the cups,
 considering also the adaptor height (see table below).
- Adaptor + Pipe + Cup: Device with the adaptor with the extension pipe in the middle with a cup. This selection will set the TCP at the end of the cup placed on the extension pipe (see table below).
- For customization: Device with no attachments on. This selection will set the TCP at the center of the bottom side of the device (see table below). This option is useful when the user utilizes a customized configuration and, to edit the offset of the TCP, wants to start by having a reference at the end of the device with no attachments on.



NOTE:

A higher flow can be achieved, by combining both channels, if the adaptor place is mounted 90° rotated as shown in the picture below. See more info in subsection Adaptor Plate.







6. Operation

It is assumed that the Installation has finished successfully. If not, first do the installation steps in the previous section.

The OnRobot devices can be operated in 3 different ways.

- **URCap Commands** provide an easy way to program an application
- **UR Toolbar** makes it simple to operate the tools while you are programming or during runtime.
- **URScript commands** can be used alongside other scripts.

OnRobot functions only accept input and returns output in metric units. If you have values to provide in US Standard units, use the following conversion rates.



6.1.1. 3FG15

3FG Grip

When the 3FG Grip command is executed, the gripper will try to reach the specified target (**Diameter** and **Force**). The different functions are explained below.



The command name in the robot program shows bullets • and a number in parenthesis (X).

- •(x)• Bullets outside the parenthesis means external grip
- (•x•) Bullets inside the parenthesis means internal grip
- · The number in parenthesis shows the target diameter

Select device

When two grippers are used, these buttons will select which one of the two grippers performs the action. The active button will have a blue background.

Grip workpiece

select this if the workpiece will be gripped externally. If this is selected the internal gripper diameter will be shown on the target and current diameter.

select this if the workpiece will be gripped internally. If this is selected the external gripper diameter will be shown on the target and current diameter.

Target



Diameter: The target gripping diameter can be set by using the Save as **Target** button (recommended) or by typing it in manually. The external gripper diameter will be shown if grip internally is selected and the internal gripper diameter will be show if grip externally is selected.

Force: Set the target gripping Force.

Stop if force not applied: If this is enabled and the Target Force is not applied, the robot program will stop.

When pressed, the gripper will act as if the command is executed.



NOTE:

To achieve the Target Force, the Target Diameter must be the workpiece diameter - [1-5] mm for external grip and + [1-5] mm for internal grip depending on the softness of the workpiece. To ensure that target diameter is correct, it is

recommended to use the open and close buttons to find the workpiece diameter and use save as target button to save the diameter with \pm 3 mm accordingly.

More information about the force can be found on section **Gripping Force**.

In the table below, the different states of the gripper are shown. This helps to ensure that the command is programmed to grip with the specified force.



6.1.2. HEX-E/H QC

F/T Control

Applications such as polishing, deburring, sanding or grinding may require holding constant force/torque to a defined direction during movements.

This command alters the trajectory of its child node(s) in order to keep the force/torque values constant along/about the selected axes.




NOTE:

UR's built-in Move commands cannot be used under the F/T Control command. To move the robot under the force control, use the F/T Move or F/T Search command instead.



NOTE:

To cancel any force/torque offset, execute an F/T Zero command at the beginning of the F/T Control command and make sure the tool is not in contact with any object before starting the F/T Control, otherwise the command may not work properly.






Compliant axis Fx, Fy, Fz, Tx, Ty, Tz: The axis selection that needs to be compliant. If an axis is enabled (compliant) the movement along/about that axis is force/torque controlled otherwise (non-compliant) position controlled. The enabled axis is controlled to keep the set force/torque value constant. At least one compliant axis must be selected.

Coordinate system: The coordinate system used both for the movement and for the sensor reading. It can be set to Base, Tool, Custom (Base), Custom (Tool) (according to the UR's reference frames). The Custom coordinate systems are calculated from the basis coordinate system and the given Roll, Pitch and Yaw values. For the Custom (Base) coordinate system, it is also possible to use the **Get TCP orientation** button to specify the orientation of the coordinate system, by the orientation of the current TCP. To test the given orientation, the **Rotate tool to this orientation [HOLD]** button can be used.

P gain F: The force controller can be tuned with this proportional gain parameter. If any overshoots or vibrations occur, try lowering the gain value (e.g.: 0.5).

P gain T: The torque controller can be tuned with this proportional gain parameter. If any overshoots or vibrations occur, try lowering the gain value (e.g.: 0.5).

Show advanced options: If checked then more options become available:



I gain F: The force controller can be tuned with this integral gain parameter. If any overshoots or vibrations occur, try lowering the gain value.

I gain T: The torque controller can be tuned with this integral gain parameter. If any overshoots or vibrations occur, try lowering the gain value.

D gain **F**: The force controller can be tuned with this derivative gain parameter. If any overshoots or vibrations occur, try lowering the gain value.

D gain T: The torque controller can be tuned with this derivative gain parameter. If any overshoots or vibrations occur, try lowering the gain value.

This command has no return value.

Guidelines to PID force/torque controller settings:



The PID force/torque controller continuously calculates the error value for the force/torque measured by the sensor, compared to the values set by the ${\tt F/T}$ Control command, and applies correction based on this error.

P gain F and **P gain T**: The proportional term produces a correction that is proportional to the current error value. Increasing this parameter, has the following effects: faster reaction, overreaction, lower error, stability degradation.

I gain F and **I gain T**: The integral term produces a correction that is proportional to both, the magnitude, and duration of the past error values. Increasing this parameter, has the following effects: faster reaction, overreaction, lower error, stability degradation.

D gain **F** and **D** gain **T**: The derivative term produces a correction that is proportional to the slope or changing speed of past error values. Increasing this parameter, has the following effects: less overreaction, stability increase.

If the force control is too slow, that is, the tool occasionally leaves the surface instead of continually touching it, try increasing the **P gain F**, **P gain T**, **I gain F** and **I gain T** values.

If the force control is overreacting to changes, that is, the tool bounces off the surface, try decreasing the **P** gain **F** and **P** gain **T** (or **D** gain **F** and **D** gain **T**, if it is above 1).

If the force control is reacting to changes too slowly, that is it keeps pushing the surface hard after touching it, try decreasing the I Gain.

As a rule of thumb, it is recommended to use values:

```
P Gain < 5\
I Gain < 0.25\
D Gain < 1\
The ratio of P Gain/I Gain = 10
```

Values that can be used as a base for tuning are:

P Gain F = 1, I Gain F = 0.1, D Gain F = 0.3 P Gain T = 0.2, I Gain T = 0, D Gain T = 0

F/T Move


The F/T Move command can be used together with the F/T Waypoint, to move the robot along a route, or together with the F/T Path to move the robot along a path and stop once the defined force/torque limits are reached (movement interrupted). In this case a warning can be generated. If the movement reaches the last waypoint, the move is successful.



NOTE:

To cancel any force/torque offset, execute an F/T Zero command at the beginning of the F/T Move command and make sure the tool is not in contact with any object before starting the F/T Move, otherwise the command may not stop at the given force/torque limit.





To operate the F/T Move command tap on the **Add** {{ waypoint.title }} button to add an F/T Waypoint as a child node. More waypoints can be added in the same way. To remove a waypoint, use the **Structure** tab **Delete** button.

Alternatively, F/T Waypoint or F/T Path could be added as a child node of the F/T Move command by using the **Structure** tab.


Speed: The movement speed limit while moving. The movement is carried out in a constant translational speed. If the route or path has sharp changes in the direction, or the orientation, the actual speed of the robot may be less than specified, but still constant throughout the route or Path.

Acceleration: The acceleration and deceleration parameter of the movement.

Coordinate system: The coordinate system used both for the movement and for the sensor reading. It can be set to Base, Tool, Custom (Base), Custom (Tool) (according to the UR's reference frames). The Custom coordinate systems are calculated from the basis coordinate system and the given Roll, Pitch and Yaw values. For the Custom (Base) coordinate system, it is also possible to use the **Get TCP orientation** button to specify the orientation of the coordinate system, by the orientation of the current TCP. To test the given orientation, the **Rotate tool to this orientation [HOLD]** button can be used.

Show advanced options: If checked then more options become available:





F/T Limit Fx,Fy,Fz,Tx,Ty,Tz,F3D,T3D: If any of the values reach the set threshold the stop is triggered. Values equal to zero are neglected. More than one option can be set.


If the **Use absolute values** option is enabled, then it is not important whether the entered value is positive or negative (e.g.: |Fz| > = 3), otherwise the sign defines how the threshold is calculated (e.g.: Fz > = 3 or Fz <= -3)

Halt program execution when limits are exceeded: If enabled then the program execution will be stopped when the target position is not reached (the move is not successful since the F/T Limit is reached). If the move is successful, then the program continues. If disabled, then no pop-up message is shown but the user can handle any possible errors using the return value of the command. See return values in the 6.5. Return Values section.

F/T Path

The F/T Path command can be used together with the F/T Move or F/T Search command, to record and replay a Path.

F/T Insert Part

It stops when the defined insertion depth is reached.

Guidelines to PID force/torque controller settings:

The PID force/torque controller continuously calculates the error value for the force/torque measured by the sensor, compared to the values set by the ${\tt F/T}$ Control command, and applies correction based on this error.

P gain F and **P gain T**: The proportional term produces a correction that is proportional to the current error value. Increasing this parameter, has the following effects: faster reaction, overreaction, lower error, stability degradation.

I gain F and **I gain T**: The integral term produces a correction that is proportional to both, the magnitude, and duration of the past error values. Increasing this parameter, has the following effects: faster reaction, overreaction, lower error, stability degradation.

D gain **F** and **D** gain **T**: The derivative term produces a correction that is proportional to the slope or changing speed of past error values. Increasing this parameter, has the following effects: less overreaction, stability increase.

If the force control is too slow, that is, the tool occasionally leaves the surface instead of continually touching it, try increasing the **P gain F**, **P gain T**, **I gain F** and **I gain T** values.


The F/T Waypoint command is used together with the F/T Move or F/T Search command, to move the robot along a route. There are three types of waypoints (Fixed, Relative, and Variable), that can be used in any combination.



NOTE:

Do not use consecutive F/T Waypoints that only contain rotations in the same F/T Move command. Use more than one F/T Move commands to achieve rotations without translational movements.

Type: The type of the waypoint. It can be set to Fixed, Relative, or Variable.




Target TCP pose: The position represented by the waypoint in the robot route. It is a readonly field and can be filled by using the **Get current TCP pose** button.

Clear: deletes the contents of the Target TCP pose field.


Get current TCP pose: inserts the current TCP coordinates into the Target TCP pose field.



Move robot to pose [HOLD]: moves the robot to the pose set in the **Target TCP pose** field, if the button is pressed. Once it is released the robot stops.



Variable: The position represented by the waypoint in the robot route. A variable can define the target pose. The variable needs to be created first.




Relative X, Y, Z, RX, RY, RZ: the distances and rotations this waypoint represents, compared to the previous robot position.

This command has no return value.



F/T Zero


The F/T Zero command can be used to zero the force/torque values.

TCP



6.1.4. RG2/6

RG Grip

The RG Grip command is used to grip/release a workpiece.

When the RG Grip command is executed, the gripper will try to reach the specified target (**Width** and **Force**) and, if selected, **Depth compensation**. The different functions are explained below.



Select device

When two grippers are used, the radio buttons with the gripper's name will appear. These buttons will select which one of the two grippers performs the action.

Target


Width: The target gripping width can be set by using the button (recommended) or by typing it in manually.



When pressed, the gripper will act as if the command is executed.

Force: Set the target gripping Force (3-40 N for the RG2 and 25-120 N for the RG6).

Depth compensation: During closing and opening the gripper, the robot moves to compensate for the circular movement of the fingers, so that the fingertips remain on the target. When the icon is pressed, the following graphical illustration will appear in a new page.





NOTE:

For optimal performance of gripping Force, set the **Target Width** 1 to 4 mm lower than the **Width** of the workpiece if the workpiece is grabbed externally or 1 to 4 mm higher if grabbed internally.

For optimal performance of **Depth compensation** set the robot speed slider to 100%.

Current width

The number shows the **Current width** value.

will set the **Current width** as target width. If used when a grasp is detected (see image below) this will set the target width as current width – 3 mm if the workpiece is grabbed externally and + 3 mm if the workpiece is grabbed internally.







These are open and close hold-to-run buttons.



NOTE:

To enhance width precision the target Force is not applied when using these buttons





Target

Screw length: Input the length of the screw.




The screwdriver's bit should be at least 50 mm away from the picking point until the screw is waiting in place. Otherwise, the magnetic force of the Screwbit System will attract the screw sidewise and it might cause a misalignment between the screw and the bit.

6.1.5.2. Tighten Screw

When the Tighten Screw command is executed, the screwdriver will move and rotate the Screw-bit System until it reaches the thread. Then, it will start to screw in the screw until 90% of the **Screwing length** is inside. During the rest 10% of the **Screwing length**, the screwdriver will tighten the screw applying the **Target Torque**.

In the **6.6.5. Feedback variables** section, the variables that provides information about the result of the command are explained.

The different functions are explained below.



Target

Screw size: The screw sizes from M1.6 to M6 can be selected. This selection will autofill a suggested torque value for that particular screw type.

Torque: Input the target tightening torque.

Screwing length = A-B-C: The resulting screwing length is shown here. This is the amount of the screw that will be screwed into the thread. To set the value use the **Set screwing length** card and the resulting amount will be the **A** (screw length) - **B** (Washer thickness) - **C** (Chamfer deepness).

When pressed, the screwdriver will act as if the command is executed.




Check results

Selecting one of the 3 options from the dropdown list and pressing **Insert** will add an if statement in the robot program based on the selected option.

The Dropdown list options are:

- Process successful: Uses the function get_sd_Process_OK() and returns true if the command is executed correctly.

Set screwing length

The image shows 3 different lengths:

A = This is the screw length, distance from the screw bit to the bottom part of the screw head.

B = This is the washer thickness (or piece in between screw and thread), if no piece is used set it as 0. This amount will be subtracted from the Screw length to provide the resulting **Screwing length**.

C = This is the chamfer deepness. This amount will be subtracted from the Screw length to provide the resulting **Screwing length**.

The background of the **A**, **B**, and **C** fields becomes yellow, respectively, when the **Screwing length** is out of range.


6.1.5.3. Loosen Screw

When the Loosen Screw command is executed, the Screwdriver will move and rotate the bit to align it with the screw head. Then, it will loosen and unscrew the screw until it is out the thread (specified **Unscrewing length**). Afterwards, it will hide the Screw-bit System inside the housing.

In the **6.6.5. Feedback variables** section, the variables that provides information about the result of the command are explained.

The different functions are explained below.





Target

Unscrewing length = A-B-C: The resulting unscrewing length is shown here. This is the amount of the screw that will be unscrewed from the thread. To set the value use the **Set unscrewing length** card and the resulting amount will be the **A** (screw length) - **B** (Washer thickness) - **C** (Chamfer deepness).





Shank position

Current: shows the current position of the shank.

Target: selects the target shank position. The target position can also be set by using the input field above the slider.

When pressed, the screwdriver will act as if the command is executed.






The SG Grip/SG Release command is used to grip or release a workpiece.

When the SG Grip/SG Release command is executed, the gripper will try to reach the specified target **Width**, moving by the default **Gentle grip speed**, and if selected, **Depth compensation**. The different functions are explained below.



NOTE:

The gripper first needs to be initialized, otherwise "Program is not finished" error message can appear. In this case open the Toolbar and click on the **Initialize** button.





WARNING:

When working with the SG, please make sure that the grippers inward/outward motion is not obstructed, otherwise the positioning system may get out of sync. If that were to happen, move the grip/release point away from the workpiece, and reinitialize the gripper.

The command name in the robot program shows a number in brackets that represent the target width. If two SG gripper are used, a number in squared bracket will show what gripper performs the action.





NOTE:

Gentle grip and **Workpiece** options are only available in the SG Grip command.

Select device

If two SG grippers are connected, select whether it is the SG (1) or SG (2) that performs the action


Target

Width: The target gripping width can be set by using the Save as Target/Save Grasp button (recommended) or by typing it in manually. If the set value is not within the limits of this tool, this will appear next to mm.



NOTE:

If the SG is connected via the CB3 tool connector, the **Current width** and the **Target Width**, is shown in percent instead of mm. In each SG Tool manual, you can find a percentage to mm conversion graph.



Depth compensation: During grip/release operations, the robot moves to compensate for movement of the gripper, so that the gripper remains on target.

Gentle grip: When selected, the gripping speed is reduced at 12.5mm before the specified target width, this results in a gentler grip, compared to normal grip settings. For the release command, the gripper moves at full speed and this feature is deactivated.

When the ? icon is pressed, a graphical illustration of the **Depth compensation** and the **Gentle grip** will appear.



NOTE:

This \triangle will appear under the gripper image if there is a mismatch between the current and the saved tool



NOTE:

It is highly recommended to use the hold-to-run buttons for finetuning, especially when handling fragile items. See the Technical section on **How to Handle a Workpiece** for more information.

Current width

The number shows the **Current width** value.





6.1.7. VG10/VGC10

VG Grip

This command is used to activate the pump and generate vacuum to grip a workpiece.





When 2 grippers are used, the radio buttons **Gripper 1** and **Gripper 2** will appear. These buttons will select which one of the 2 grippers performs the action. In the robot program, the command name will show [1] or [2] to indicate which grippers is performing the action.

Channel(s): Select which channel perform the action. It is possible to select channel A, B or both. To see which one is channel A and B, for VG10 see stickers under the arms and for VGC10 see the letters on the sides on the housing.

Vacuum: The higher the vacuum is set (up to 80 kPa) the more the lifting power is.

Payload mass: the workpiece weight can be entered. The URCap software will then perform the calculation of the resulting payload mass considering the gripper, the Quick Changer, and the workpiece mass.

Stop robot on subsequent loss of vacuum: when checked, the vacuum is monitored continuously and if the vacuum disappears unexpectedly the robot will stop with a popup.

Wait for proper grip: when checked, the program will stay in the VG Grip structure until commanded vacuum is achieved. If the commanded vacuum is not achieved in 3 seconds the program halts.

When pressed, the gripper will act as if the command is executed.

When any of the VG grippers is used in combination with a HEX-E/H QC the following extra option becomes available:

Seek and auto level: when checked, the gripper will be moved by the robot in the +Z direction (in Tool coordinate system) until it reaches a surface (this is the seek part) with both channels. This feature is only useful if both channels are going to do the grip at the same time. During the motion the gripper's orientation is automatically adjusted to be parallel to the surface (this is the auto level part).





NOTE:

In order to help the Auto-level part to function, make sure to use the same suction caps for A and B channels and set the arms to be symmetrical.

When any of the VG grippers is used without a HEX-E/H QC but used on an E-series controller the following extra option becomes available:

Seek: when checked, the same seeking action will happen as above. Since the auto leveling part is not used the VG grippers need to be parallel to the surface.



NOTE:


Setting a lower vacuum gives a faster grip with less wear on the vacuum cups. It also reduces the risk of leaving suction marks on delicate workpieces.

It can take a few seconds when pressing **Play** or **Test** before the robot program starts. This is normal.

When the two channels are set to different vacuum percentages the VG grippers automatically release air into the channel with lower pressure. This feature is activated when the pressure is more than 20% vacuum over the setting. Releasing air generates a characteristic rumbling sound and change in pumping speed.

VG Release

This command is used to release the grip of the workpiece by removing vacuum.





When 2 grippers are used, the radio buttons **Gripper 1** and **Gripper 2** will appear. These buttons will select which one of the 2 grippers performs the action. In the robot program, the command name will show [1] or [2] to indicate which grippers is performing the action.


Channel(s): Select which channel perform the action. It is possible to select channel A, B or both. To see which one is channel A and B, for VG10 see stickers under the arms and for VGC10 see the letters on the sides on the housing.

Back away from workpiece: when the workpiece is released, the robot will travel away 15 mm.

When pressed, the gripper will act as if the command is executed.


6.2. URCap Toolbar

The Toolbar makes it simple to operate the tools while you are programming or during runtime.

How to Access the Toolbar

The way how the toolbar can be accessed is different on the e-Series and the CB3 UR robots, but the functionality is the same.

To open up the toolbar in the e-Series, press on the UR+ icon on the top right side. Then press on the OnRobot icon .



Each OnRobot End of Arm Tooling has its own functionality and that is explained in the sections below.


To open up the toolbar in the CB3, press on the OnRobot icon on the top left side. The icon might take around 20 seconds to appear after robot power up.


All toolbars are disabled while any robot program is running. Some toolbars are also disabled and cannot be used while the robot is not initialized.





To enable/disable the toolbar, press on the OnRobot logo Grobot on the top right corner and check/uncheck the **Enable toolbar** checkbox.









The used coordinate system is the Tool.

To deactivate any axis that has been selected, tap on the item again.



NOTE:

It is possible to activate or deactivate axes during hand guiding.

To start hand guiding the UR robot, first make sure that you do not touch the tool and then press and hold the enable button . The button turns to an hourglass icon



while the hand guiding is being initiated. Wait until the enable button turns blue and drive the robot by hand with the help of the OnRobot sensor.



NOTE:

Make sure that you do not touch the tool before the hand guiding is activated (enable button turned to blue button), otherwise the robot can behave abnormally (e.g..: the robot could move without any external force exerted). In this case, press the zero button, while you are not touching the tool.

Make sure that you do not use the zero button while touching the tool.

To stop hand guiding the UR Robot, press the enable button



NOTE:

The hand guiding could be configured (in the OnRobot installation page) to be enabled with a single tap on the enable button (instead of holding) and stopped with a second tap. However, the holding behavior is recommended for increased safety.



NOTE:

Please always set the speed slider of the robot to 100% while using the hand quiding to have an optimal user experience.

The zero button is intended to be used when the tool orientation is changed during hand guiding, so that the effects of gravity or changes in the load of the robot can be neutralized.

The snap to axes button rotates the axes of the tool coordinate system to align with the closest axes of the base coordinate system, disregarding negative or positive directions. This allows the user to set the tool to face precisely horizontally, or vertically, after guiding by hand.



When the OnRobot URCap is enabled, there will be several 3FG script functions available:

force: The force that the gripper will try to reach. [N]

external_grip: If true, the internal gripper diameter to do an external grip will be used. If false, the external gripper diameter to do an internal grip will be used.



stop if no force =true: If true, the robot program will stop if the force is not reached.

tool_index: Select what gripper performs the action. 0 only one gripper connected, 1 for gripper in position 1 and 2 for gripper position 2. Positions of the dual quick changer.

blocking=True: the function waits for the gripper to finish the grip command.

diameter: The diameter that the gripper will open to. [mm]

tool_index: Select what gripper performs the action. 0 only one gripper connected, 1 for gripper in position 1 and 2 for gripper position 2. Positions of the dual quick changer.

blocking=True: the function waits for the gripper to finish the grip command.

For example, a relative movement for quickly releasing a workpiece can be done as follows: If only one gripper is connected:

 $tfg_release(3fg_Diameter+5, 3fg_index_get())$ This will open the Gripper 5mm with the default speed.

If two 3FG grippers are attached, use:

For example, a relative movement for quickly releasing a workpiece can be done as follows:

If only one gripper is connected:

rg_grip(rg_Width+5, 40, rg_index_get()) \rightarrow This will open the Gripper 5mm with the target force set at 40N.

If two RG grippers attached, use:

rg_grip(rg_Width_primary+5, 40, 1) \rightarrow for primary
rg_grip(rg_Width_secondary+5, 40, 2) \rightarrow for secondary

rg_grip (rg_Width+5, 40, rg_index_get()) \rightarrow This will open the Gripper 5mm with the target force set at 40N.

If two RG grippers attached, use:

rg_grip(rg_Width_secondary+5, 40, 2) \rightarrow for secondary

6.3.4. Screwdriver

When the OnRobot URCap is enabled, there will be several Screwdriver script functions available:

- get sd Process OK(): True if the command is executed correctly.
- get sd Process NOK(): True if the command is not executed correctly.
- get_sd_Achieved_torque(): Achieved torque in Nm after a tighten command has been executed.
- get_sd_Torque_gradient(): Achieved torque gradient in Nm/rad after a tighten command has been executed.
- get_sd_Command_results(): The possible values are:
 - 0 no additional result data
 - 1 command unknown
 - 2 not screwing in
 - 3 timeout waiting for correct torque (2sec)
 - 4 torque exceeded unexpected (premature)
 - 5 unable to loosen screw (maximum torque exceeded)
 - 6 Shank reached the 55 mm position
 - 7 Shank obstructed during move
- get_sd_Target_torque(): Last Tighten command Target torque in Nm after it has been executed.
- sd_check_torque(tolerance_nm): This will return true if the sd_Achieved_torque is within the range of the sd_Target_torque +/- the tolerance nm.
 - Tolerance nm: the toque error allowed.
- sd move(shank pos mm, tool index)
 - shank_pos_mm: the position the shank will move to.

 - shank force n: The force the shank is going to apply. Default value 20N.
 - Screw lenght mm: The length of the screw.
 - tool_index: Select what screwdriver performs the action. 0 only one screwdriver connected, 1 for screwdriver in position 1 and 2 for screwdriver position 2. Positions of the dual quick changer.timeout_ms: the time the command will keep trying to be executed. If it is not executed in the given time, a return variable will show an error.
- sd_tighten(shank_force_n, screwing_l_mm, torque_nm, tool_index, timeout ms):
 - shank_force_n: The force the shank is going to apply. Default value 20N.
 - screwing 1 mm: The length the screw will be screwed into the thread.
 - torque nm: The target torque the screw will be tighten with.
 - tool_index: Select what screwdriver performs the action. 0 only one screwdriver connected, 1 for screwdriver in position 1 and 2 for screwdriver position 2. Positions of the dual quick changer.
 - timeout_ms: the time the command will keep trying to be executed. If it is not executed in the given time, a return variable will show an error.
- sd loosen(shank force n, unscrewing lenght mm, tool index, timeout ms):
 - shank force n: The force the shank is going to apply. Default value 20N.
 - unscrewing 1 mm: The length the screw will be screwed out from the thread.
 - tool_index: Select what screwdriver performs the action. 0 only one screwdriver connected, 1 for screwdriver in position 1 and 2 for screwdriver position 2. Positions of the dual quick changer.
 - timeout_ms: the time the command will keep trying to be executed. If it is not executed in the given time, a return variable will show an error.
- sd stop(tool index): The screwdriver will stop the running command.
- get sd Busy(): True if the screwdriver is executing a command.
- get sd Current torque(): Provides the current measured torque

6.3.5. SG

When the OnRobot URCap is enabled, there will be several SG script functions available:

6.3.6. VG10/VGC10

>0 = Waiting time [s]. Floating point numbers can be used. E.g. 0.6 = 600 ms.

If not set, this parameter defaults to 5 seconds.

alert: Whether the grip should be monitored after vacuum (grip) is established. If vacuum is lost while handling a workpiece, a popup warning is shown, and the robot program stops. This setting cannot be used without a proper timeout setting, see above.

False = Vacuum is not monitored
```

True = Vacuum is continuously monitored. Popup warning enabled

If not set, this parameter defaults to True.

6.4. TCP Configuration

TCP is the abbreviation of the Tool Center Point.



TCF

TCP is a point that is in the beginning (by default) located at the middle point of the UR's tool flange. This is an important point during robot programming since UR's Move commands are always referenced to a given TCP point and rotations could only be carried out about these points.



If a tool is attached to the robot, it makes easier for the user to change that point to the tool's "end" point (see illustration on the left).

In this way it is easy to rotate the tool while the workpiece is being stationary in space (see illustration on the right).

More than one TCP point could be defined but at a given time only one TCP can be active. In UR, it is called the Active TCP.

By default, UR's Move commands are always recording the Waypoints according to the Active TCP.

For further info about the UR's TCP handling read the UR's Manual.

How "far" the TCP needs to be moved to be at the "end" of the OnRobot tools could be found in the **8.3. COG, TCP** section.

Since, it could be hard to enter these values by hand, OnRobot provides two ways to get these parameters configured for you:

- Static TCP mode Recommended to be used
- Dynamic TCP mode

The mode could be selected on the TCP panel in the OnRobot Installation (see in the **5.3**. **URCap Setup** setup section).


In the following these two modes will be described.

Static TCP Mode

In this mode the user can manually change the Active TCP based on the predefined OnRobot TCP options:



OnRobot_Single
 If no Dual Quick Changer is detected, so only one tool is used.





If a Dual Quick Changer is detected, so two tools are used.



NOTE:

OnRobot_Dual_1 belongs to the tool that is attached to the Primary side of the Dual Quick Changer.

The TCP values are created and precalculated based on the detected tool(s). So, if the RG2 is mounted in 30° (with the built-in tilting mechanism) the precise TCP is defined accordingly.

The calculation is only carried out when a new device is detected or when the mounting angle is changed (only for RG2/6 and RG2-FT).

The calculated values are static parameters and do not change during program execution.



NOTE:


For the RG2, RG6 and RG2-FT grippers the TCP is calculated always assuming that the gripper is fully closed.

It is a good practice to set the used TCP option as the Default TCP () in the UR's TCP Configuration, but it is not mandatory.

However, it is highly recommended to create the Waypoints in the UR's Move command in a way that the referencing TCP is set first.

So, if only a single OnRobot device is used, before the Waypoints are defined, set the UR's Move command's TCP to use the **OnRobot_Single**.





If two OnRobot devices are used, select **OnRobot_Dual_1** or **OnRobot_Dual_2** accordingly. If not the UR's Move command but the OnRobot F/T Move command is used (for HEX-E/H QC or RG2-FT only):

• Use the OnRobot TCP command just before the \mathbb{F}/\mathbb{T} Move to set the Active TCP to the right value

As summary here is a code example:

Dynamic TCP Mode

In this mode the UR's Active TCP is set automatically according to the detected OnRobot device.

This mode is useful when the TCP effect of the width value of the gripper (RG2, RG6 or RG2-FT only) is needed to be considered.


During the robot program execution if the \mathtt{RG} \mathtt{Grip} commands are used to open or close the gripper TCP is automatically set accordingly.

Furthermore, if the OnRobot Toolbar is used to open or close the gripper the Active TCP is adjusted immediately.

However, the Active TCP is overwritten directly, there is also an OnRobot defined TCP, that is called:



This is the name in both the Single and Dual device case.



It is recommended to set the **OnRobot_Default** option as the Default TCP () in the UR's TCP Configuration.

To let the system to automatically update the TCP during the program execution the UR's Move commands needs to be left at its default setting of **Set as Active TCP**. (Compared to the Static TCP mode where it is needed to be changed to a predefined TCP).

In case when two grippers are used, the Active TCP needs to be selected to which gripper to belong to:

- first use an OnRobot TCP command and select from Gripper 1 and Gripper 2 which one to
- then the UR's Move will have an updated Active TCP that could be used for multiple Move commands
- when it will be necessary to change to the other gripper just use another TCP and select the other gripper.

Before you teach any Waypoint make sure to set the Active TCP beforehand:

- for Single device go to the OnRobot Installation panel
- for Dual devices go to the OnRobot Installation panel and Select the Device (1 or 2) that you are using at the time of the teaching

As summary here is a code example:

6.7. Application Examples

6.7.1. Screwdriver

Below a simple **Screw in application** is explained:

Lines 2 - 7: the robot moves to the screw feeder and wait for a digital input signal from the screw feeder saying that the screw is ready to be picked up.



NOTE:


The screwdriver's bit should be at least 50 mm away from the picking point until the screw is waiting in place. Otherwise, the magnetic force of the Screwbit system will attract the screw sidewise and it might cause a misalignment between the screw and the bit.



Lines 8 -14: the Pick Screw command is executed. If the command is not successful, the robot will move to separate from the screw feeder and a popup will be displayed saying "Missing screws". Else the robot program will continue.

Lines 15 - 22: the robot moves form the screw feeder to the thread

Lines 21 - 27: the Tighten Screw command is executed. An if statement will check that the achieved torque is within the range of the target torque +/- the tolerances. The tolerances in this case are 0.04 Nm. If the achieved torque is within range, the condition will return true and the program will continue. Else a popup will be displayed saying "Unexpected Torque".





7. Additional Software Options

7.1. Compute Box

7.1.1. Interfaces

There are two interface types that could be used:

· Ethernet interface

This interface can be used to access the Web Client that can be used to monitor, control, and update the grippers/devices. Furthermore, via this interface the OnRobot WebLogic™ can also be accessed to program the Digital I/O Interface.

Digital I/O interface

This interface could be used to communicate via simple digital I/O lines with the robots. There are 8 digital input and 8 digital output that could be used. These inputs and outputs can be programmed through the OnRobot WebLogic™ that requires the Ethernet interface to be used (only for programming time).

7.1.2. Web Client

To access the Web Client on your computer first the Ethernet interface needs to be set up to have a proper communication between your computer and the Compute Box. It is recommended to use **Auto mode**.

Configure the IP address in **Auto Mode** as follows:



Use the factory default settings (DIP switch 3 and 4 in OFF position).

In this case, the Compute Box has both Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) client, and DHCP server enabled.

DHCP Client enabled means, Compute Box will automatically obtain ("get") IP address FROM the connected robot/computer if that is capable of assigning ("give") IP to the Compute Box.

DHCP Server enabled means, Compute Box will automatically assign ("give") IP address TO the connected robot/computer if that was configured to obtain ("get") IP address automatically.



NOTE:

The assigned IP range is 192.168.1.100-105 (with subnet mask 255.255.255.0).

If the Compute Box is used in a company network where a DHCP server is already in use, it is recommended to disable the DHCP server of the Compute Box by setting DIP switch 4 to the ON position.

If no IP was assigned to the Compute Box within a minute, it will automatically get a fallback IP address (192.168.1.1).





NOTE:

If the Compute Box was in **Advanced mode**, first reset the IP setting by switching to **Fixed IP mode** and then switch back to **Auto mode**.

After the IP address is configured, do the following steps:

- Connect the Compute Box to your computer with the supplied UTP cable.
- Power the Compute Box with the supplied power supply
- Wait one minute for the Compute Box LED to turn from blue to green.
- Open a web browser on your computer and type in the IP address of the Compute Box (factory default is 192.168.1.1).




7.1.3. Web Client: Devices Menu

To control/monitor a device click on the **Select** button.





7.1.3.1. 3FG15



The state of the gripper could be:

- Busy the gripper is in motion
- Grip detected the gripper has detected a workpiece
- Force grip detected the gripper has applied the target force to a workpiece. This also activates a break. See more info in section Finger Movement and Force.

The gripper can be controlled in two modes:

- Move mode The easiest way to move the gripper but the gripping force is limited (<50N).
 This should be used to release a part and open the gripper.
- Grip mode This should be used to properly grip a part with a given target force. If the
 part is properly gripped (target force is reached) the break will engage to make sure the
 part will not be dropped in case of a power loss.

In Move mode:



The gripper can be controlled by adjusting the **Target raw diameter** slider. The actual values of the fingers are shown by the **Current raw diameter**. The raw diameter is without the fingertip offset.

In **Grip** mode:

First set how to grip the part:

- Externally or
- Internally

To grip on a part set the **Target diameter** and **Target force** and click on the **Grip** button.

There are two ways how the target diameter can be given:

- Enter manually make sure to add 3mm to the part diameter if it is gripped internally and subtract 3mm if it is gripped externally
- Use the Calculate target button:

Move the fingers with the slider to touch the part and activate the **Grip detected** (open fully for an internal grip or close fully for an external grip).

Based on whether it will be external or internal the **Current calculated target** (diameter) for the grip is shown. The fingertip offset is either added or subtracted to compensate for the set fingertip.

Grip type	Current calculated target value

Click on the Calculate target button to load the calculated value to the Target diameter.

If the grip was successful, the **Force grip detected** signal should be activated and the engaged brake should make a clicking sound.


During the gripping the motion of the finger can be terminated by clicking on the **Stop** button.

To release the part from a gripped status, move the gripper:

- Outward in case of an external grip
- Inward in case of an internal grip.

The default finger setting can be changed on the **Settings** tab:





- **Select finger position** Select the mounted finger position and **Save**.
- **Set finger length** If customized fingers are needed, the checkbox can be enabled, and the new finger length can be entered.



To recover from a Triggered state:







Screwing parameters and functions:

- **Screw type** The screw sizes from M1.6 to M6 can be selected. This selection will autofill the standard torque value for that particular screw type.
- Torque Input the target tightening torque.
- Screwing length = A-B-C: The resulting screwing length is shown here. This is the amount of the screw that will be screwed into/unscrewed from the thread. To set the value use input fields below and the resulting amount will be A (screw length) B (Washer thickness) C (Chamfer deepness).

The image shows 3 different lengths:


- **A** = This is the screw length, distance from the bottom to the head of the screw.
- **B** = This is the washer thickness (or piece in between screw and thread), if no piece is used set it as 0. This amount will be subtracted from the Screw length to provide the resulting Screwing length.
- **C** = This is the chamfer deepness. This amount will be subtracted from the Screw length to provide the resulting Screwing length.
- **Tighten** When this command is executed, the screwdriver will move and rotate the Screw-bit system until it reaches the thread. Then, it will start to screw in the screw until 90% of the Screwing length is inside the thread. During the rest 10% of the Screwing length, the screwdriver will tighten the screw applying the Target Torque.
- **Loosen** When this command is executed, the screwdriver will move and rotate the bit to align it with the screw head. Then, it will loosen and unscrew the screw until it is out the thread (specified screwing length). Afterwards, it will hide the Screw-bit system inside the housing.
- Stop This will stop the screwdriver command that is executed at that time.

Other functions

- Shank position changes the position of the shank immediately.
- Screw length input the length of the screw that will be picked up.
- **Pick up screw** When this command is executed, the screwdriver will move and rotate the bit to align it with the screw head, then it will pick up the screw and hide it inside the housing.
- Stop This will stop the screwdriver command that is executed at that time.





The **Network mode** drop-down menu can be used to decide if the Compute Box will have a static or a dynamic IP address:

• If it is set to **Dynamic IP**, the Compute Box expects an IP address from a DHCP server. If the network that the device is connected to has no DHCP server, then the fixed 192.168.1.1 IP is used for the device (after 60 seconds of timeout).



- If it is set to Static IP, then a fixed IP address and subnet mask must be set.
- If it is set to **Default Static IP**, the fixed IP revert to the factory default and cannot be changed.

After all parameters are set, click on the **Save** button to store the new values permanently. Wait 1 minute and reconnect to the device using the new settings.

Compute Box / Eye Box settings:

In case, more than one Compute Box is used within the same network, for identification purpose any user specific name can be entered to the **Display name**.

EtherNet/IP scanner settings:




In the graph below, how the % of maximum achievable force decreases as the finger length increases when customized fingertips are used.









Gripping Force

The total gripping force highly depends on the finger angle θ . For both internal and external grip, the lower the finger angle, the higher the force that will be applied as shown in the graph below.

Although the fingers can move from 0 to 180, the angle range of an external grip is 30°-165° and for an internal grip 20°-160°



Maximum Force and Finger Angle θ



Graph plotted using measurements with 1 A current, silicone fingertips and a metal workpiece.



NOTE:

The total force applied depends on the finger angle, the input current (limited in some robots' tool flange connection) and the friction coefficient between the materials of the fingertips and the workpiece.

Finger Movement and Force

The gripping action has two phases:

Phase 1: For a safety reason, the fingers will start moving with a low force (maximum $^{\sim}50$ N) to avoid damaging anything that could get clamped between the gripper fingers and the workpiece.



Phase 2: When the gripper diameter is very close to the programed target diameter, the gripper will increase the force to grip with the programed target force. After the grip, a break will be activated (tic sound). The activation of the brake, also known as, Force grip detected, can be verified in the GUI. This brake will hold the workpiece with the applied force, with no power consumption and holding the workpiece in case of power loss. This brake will automatically be deactivated when the gripper performs a release or a new grip command. While programming the gripper, the brake can be deactivated by using the features in the GUI.

RG2 Gripping Speed Graph






Proximity Sensor Typical Accuracy






RG2-FT Gripping Speed Graph







Clear optical path for the proximity sensors

Protect the proximity sensors from direct sunlight or strong light source

Avoid dust and liquid penetration



WARNING:

The proximity sensors are sensitive parts and shall be protected against:

Direct strong light (such as directional laser sources)

Direct high temperature

Mechanical contacts in any case

Expose to any liquid or fine conductive dust



NOTE:

Please clean regularly the proximity sensor surface with low pressure compressed air (<5 bar) from a 5 cm distance. For stronger contamination use isopropyl alcohol with a soft cotton swab to keep it clean.

Finger Thickness





RG6 Gripping Speed Graph



1. Screws

The first step is to know what type of screw is going to be used. The screw type will define what type of bit, screw carrier, screw fix (if any) and bit holder shall be used.

The recommended screw types for the Screwdriver are the ones that have the properties mentioned previously on the **Supported Screws** table.

2. Bit Holder

Select the right bit holder depending on the screw type and size to maximize the efficacy of the Screw-bit System based on the table in section Items Needed Depending on Screw Type and Size for Metric or Items Needed Depending on Screw Type and Size for US Standard Screws.

The Bit holder generates a magnetic force that will keep the screw attached and aligned to the bit. The Bit holder **A** generates a higher magnetic force than **B**. Therefore, the bit holder B is commonly used for the smaller and lighter screws.

3. Bits

Select the right bit depending on the screw type and size to maximize the efficacy of the Screw-bit System based on the table in section Items Needed Depending on Screw Type



and Size for Metric or Items Needed Depending on Screw Type and Size for US Standard Screws.





5. Attaching and Detaching the Screw-bit System to/from the Screwdriver

The last step is to attach the system to the Screwdriver by placing the hex shape of the bit holder inside of the end of the screwdriver's shank as shown in the picture below. The system will be attached to the screwdriver by a magnetic force.





To remove the Bit holder from the screwdriver's shank, follow the steps below:


- 1. Move the shank all the way out to position 55 by operating the user interface in the robot or in the Web Client.


To successfully execute the screwdriver commands, it is fundamental to position the screwdriver correctly. This is achieved if the following two conditions are met:

1. The Screw-bit System must be perfectly aligned to the screw or thread.





2. The distance between the Screwdriver's bottom part and the surface where the action takes place must be within the range of 0-8 mm [0-0.31 inches].

Torque Angle Curve and Torque Gradient

The torque gradient shows how the torque is applied in the last phase of the Tightening screw command. This could be used as an indicator to detect if a Tightening command is performed correctly.

For instance, the torque gradient could be different if:

• The hole thread is not long enough




- The hole thread is different from the screw thread
- The hole thread is not clean (for instance by deburrs from CNC machining)
- The friction between the screw thread and the hole thread is too low or too high
- The friction between the screw head and the tighten part is too low or too high


A torque gradient variable is made available to be checked in the robot program.

How to Handle a Workpiece

With the elastic silicone SG tools, the gripper can handle a wide range of workpieces, for a high number of applications. Different tool designs have some overlap in capability when handling the same workpiece, but the tools have different characteristics and do have individual effectiveness on a given workpiece.



Soft Silicone

Some SG tool designs has a soft silicone part in the top of the gripper. These tools are better suited for handling fragile workpieces and/or workpieces with a high variance in size, compared to the hard silicone tools. This is due to the more "forgiving" nature of the soft part. The user may experience a reduced payload compared to the hard silicone tools.

To handle a workpiece properly, the user must know some parameters that are defined by the general conditions of the workpiece and its presentation in the application. This helps to define which tool to choose and the actual grip width on it.

A general overview of such parameters is listed below:

- Shape
- Dimension
- Weight
- Roughness
- Fragility
- Orientation of pick/placement

For a better understanding of how to handle workpieces with different parameters, tests were conducted with a SG-a-H tool, see table below.

Notice objects with high weight needs higher force asserted upon them, therefor the small gripping width.





NOTE:

The results shown in the table above, should be considered as indicative and may vary. The actual grip width always require testing, for verification.

It is often a good idea to set a target width smaller, than actual workpiece width, to reach a higher surface contact area and to accommodate for vibrations and other unexpected conditions.

For heavy and large workpieces test at low velocity and with caution.

Positioning the VG10 Arms and Channels

The arms can be folded to the preferred position simply by pulling in the arms. The torque needed to overcome the friction in the rotatable joints of the arm is high (6 N/m) to ensure that the arms do not move when handling 15 kg payloads.

The VG10 suction cups are grouped into two independent channels.





When the four arms are adjusted to preferred angles, it is recommended to add the accompanied arrow stickers. This allows for easy realignment and exchanging between different work items.









The Adaptor Plate can be placed in different positions by rotating it 90°. Having as reference the letters A and B written on the gripper housing, the Adaptor Plate can be placed to separate both channels or to communicate them. If the Adaptor Plate is placed as in picture below on the left, both channels will be separated, and they can be used independently or combined. If the Adaptor Plate is placed as in picture below on the right, both channels will be communicated and a higher air flow can be achieved, although both channels will have to be used combined.

9.5. SG

For the SG Base Part



WARNING:

Please, clean the SG Base Part regularly by using a cloth and a cleaning agent with a pH value between 6-8.

When cleaning the SG Base Part please keep it mounted on the robot to prevent water getting into the connector.

After cleaning, use a cloth and clean water, to rinse of any leftover cleaning agent.

Please ensure that the used cleaning agent does not contain chlorine as this can lead to corrosion.



WARNING:

On a regular basis, check that the silicone bellow has not come loose from neither the aluminum base nor the Smart Lock male. If the bellow is not sitting correctly, this can lead to water seeping into the SG base part.

For the SG Tools

The silicone part and the smart lock female are dishwasher and autoclave safe, at temperatures =< 120°C (248°F).

Various cleaners can be used for cleaning the silicone part. Dish soap. Alcohol, regular ethanol, isopropanol and acetone works as well for cleaning.

Do not use concentrated acids and alkalis, since these can potentially damage the silicone, in particularly oxidizing acids such as sulfuric or nitric acid. It is recommended to use cleaning agent with a pH value between 2 and 13.



On a regular basis, please do a visual inspection of the smart-lock female and the ball spring. If needed clean it with a brush or cloth.

9.6. VG10/VGC10

The VG grippers are equipped with one filter for each suction cup socket, and one filter for the exhaust. How often the filters need to be changed depends on the nature of the work piece and the working environment. The VG grippers automatically de-dust the filters every time a grip is released. However, particles can eventually get stuck and build up inside the filter, lowering the VG grippers performance.

A filter service kit is available, which include both new filters and tools needed.



- Filter service kit for VG10, PN 100064
- Filter service kit for VGC10, PN 103757

Neither use nor power on the VG grippers without filters. Dust, hair and larger particles can get stuck in pump membranes and valve seats, causing permanent damage to the VG grippers.



DANGER:

Identify how often the filters need service and schedule maintenance with a fixed period short enough to ensure a firm grip at all times.

An overall inspection of the VG grippers must be performed regularly and at least once every 6 months.

Never power the VG grippers without filters or with filters mounted incorrectly. Failure to comply with this precaution can cause irreversible failure of pump or valves.
